What does this commonly shared concern entail from one culture to the next? In some cases, it means being together, sharing, constructing social ties. In other instances, it involves the proper management of the body and of one's health.

For a long time, the question of "what to eat" or "how to eat" was irrelevant, as fears and anxieties centred on the lack of food. Today, the question of choice and of the self, of the management of both needs and desires, has become the central question, linked to social and economic debates as well as to public health issues...

This symposium will be of interest to journalists, researchers, students and professionals in:

- social sciences and humanities,
- nutritional sciences, public health, health education
- business strategy, market research and communication

It will present a unique occasion to get first hand knowledge of the results of the study presented by researchers in the programme.

Presentations by researchers from other parts of the world will help open new perspectives on these issues.

In order to guarantee the scientific rigour of the programme, the following steps were taken:

- an international group of researchers was put into place and closely associated with each phase of the study,
- qualitative research was carried out in the initial two phases of the project,
- the questionnaire was distributed from Paris via telephone by native speakers of each language, with the same training,
- moderation and/or supervision of data collection and analysis by a single person who is sufficiently fluent in all four languages of the study's.

Survey programme phase

Phase one:

Focus groups carried out at the national level in 2000 and 2001, moderated by Claude Fischler or Christy Shields and associated researcher in each country, with the same moderator guide.

Second phase:

A qualitative questionnaire with open-ended questions, administered by telephone from Paris in September / October 2001 to 170 people in each country: 60 consumers, 60 teachers and 50 doctors.

Third phase:

Collection of data, end of 2001, from representative samples in each country (1000 people in France, Germany, Great Britain, Italy, Switzerland (French-speaking), USA), for a total of 6000 people.
